striking, showing it was very scared and helpless, and appears to be looking at the camera directly."


Voles are small rodents that are closely related to hamsters, although they have a longer, hairier tail and

a slightly rounder head. They aren't long-lived, with a lifespan of around three months, and have a long

list of predators ranging from hawks and falcons to snakes, weasels, raccoons, and foxes. In short,

seeing one in the clutches of a raptor is, unfortunately, not uncommon for these little, furry, largely

subterranean mammals.



"They generally start foraging just after dawn, when you'll likely catch them hovering into the wind with their head hanging down. You might also be able to catch them hovering in grassy fields at the edges of highways as you drive by," All About Birds explains.

The white-tailed kite is found all around the Americas, but isn't particularly common in the United States

outside of a small region in southern Florida and Texas and the coastal and central regions of California

and Oregon, usually seeking out grasslands or prairies.
