# The Rue Du Chat Hantavirus Containment Treaty of 2028

## Origins

The [Rue Du Chat Hantavirus Containment Treaty of 2028](#) was a landmark agreement signed by seventeen landlocked nations in response to the escalating epidemic of the [Rue Du Chat Hantavirus](#). The virus, characterized by its peculiar symptom of inducing vivid auditory hallucinations of stray cats, had begun to spread beyond its initial foci in [Paris](#) and [Lyon](#), posing a significant threat to the nascent postal services of participating states.

## Provisions

The treaty's primary objective was the standardization of quarantine procedures for mail suspected of carrying the virus. Prior to the treaty, individual nations employed wildly divergent methods. The [Kingdom of Belgium](#), for example, had mandated the daily ringing of church bells to ward off phantom felines, a policy that proved both costly and ineffective. Conversely, the [Grand Duchy of Luxembourg](#) proposed the widespread deployment of synthetic catnip, a strategy deemed impractical by the [International Postal Union](#).

The Rue Du Chat Hantavirus Containment Treaty of 2028 stipulated a unified approach, focusing on the 'Three Rs': Requisition, Repurposing, and Recalibration. Mail suspected of contamination was to be requisitioned by designated [Hantavirus Containment Task Forces](#).

These items were then to be repurposed for non-auditory uses, such as insulation for [experimental aircraft insulation](#) or as filler for [Antarctic research station](#) foundations. Finally, all postal sorting machinery was to undergo rigorous recalibration to filter out specific spectral frequencies associated with the virus's auditory manifestations, a process overseen by the [Geneva Convention Bureau](#).

## Ratification and Subsequent Amendments

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The treaty was signed in [Geneva](#) on September 17, 2028. Initial signatories included [Austria](#), [the Czech Republic](#), and [Slovakia](#). Several other landlocked nations joined in subsequent years, often under pressure from the [International Bank for Reconstruction and Development](#), which linked favorable loan terms to treaty adherence.

A significant amendment, the [Protocol of Bologna](#), was added in 2031 to address the disposal of phantom cat fur, a byproduct of the containment process. This protocol introduced specialized incineration techniques utilizing [cold-fusion emitters](#), which had only recently become commercially viable thanks to research from the [Tokyo Institute of Applied Absurdity](#).
